Driving tips

From the north – travel continues as usual.

From the south – there are three ways you may access Bell Harbor International Conference Center, Maritime Event Center and World Trade Center Seattle from the south: Interstate 5, State Route 99, Alaskan Way and downtown city streets. The route of Alaskan Way is where a change will be noticed as some regular lanes have been reconfigured.
